GÉRARD PHILIPE WRITING TABLE






The Gérard Philipe writing table was one of the first creations of Jules Wabbes in the early 1950s. It is a contemporary adaptation of the 18th-century bureau plat, featuring the typical three drawers beneath a wooden top.

This new design was noticed and awarded internationally with a silver medal in 1957 at the XI Triennale in Milan.




Jules Wabbes, who had worked as an antique dealer, had encountered restoration problems with veneer wood. He then had sought to use solid wood. To address the problem of cracks and breakdowns, he decided to have it cut and glued. This allowed him to control the problem of desiccation. Thanks to this technique, he succeeds in giving the furniture a timeless material value.

The first editions of this desk were born around 1952 with fruit wood, mahogany, then wenge and padauk. Such a use of wood assembled in straight tails not only allows the material to be highlighted, but also to take advantage of the beauty, color and warmth of the material. There are many blueprints of this desk with some variations, and even a reduced model, a model that serves as a reference for the model published today.


Above: Final design circa 1957




This writing desk is part of a series of furniture, such as bookcases and shelves, made from massive slats of wood that are glued together.

First, called "table à casiers," it is then mentioned as "T144," a table of 144 cm, on a large blueprint representing the "System of slatted furniture. Jules Wabbes system."



Above: Detail of the desk - Slatted furniture in 1957, Milan, Triennale





Three drawers or spaces left empty or equipped with Perspex were provided under the shelf. T-shaped metal legs are screwed to the structure. Their spindle silhouette gives the whole, designed as a small architecture, a light appearance.
